


The Leggett Administration LDEQ-CID

- 6 Regional Offices.
 - Investigators will be assigned to answer Regional questions.
- Answer directly through chain to Secretary.
- Criminal program is designed to address civil program issues and support the field.
- Most egregious offenders will be highlighted in order to achieve deterrence.









Civil Enforcement Actions by Parish in 2008

How does LDEQ-CID identify conduct by companies and individuals worthy of criminal investigation?



Significant Environmental Harm

Actual Harm by an illegal discharge, release or emission that has identifiable and significant harmful impact on human health or the environment.

Threat of Significant Harm to the environment or human health by an actual or threatened discharge, release or emission

near any property that is residence, business, any public playground, church, public library, school, any well or water intake

Significant Environmental Harm

Failure to Report an actual discharge, release or emission.

Violation represents a trend in industry. Criminal investigation may provide a significant deterrent effect



Culpable Conduct

- History of Repeated Violations
 when civil enforcement has failed
 to bring a violator into
 compliance
- Deliberate misconduct resulting in violation
- Concealment of misconduct or falsification of records.





Culpable Conduct

 Tampering with monitoring or control equipment so that false data appears to be accurate

 Business operating without a permit or required documentation. LDEQ's jurisdiction focuses on dangerous and strictly regulated business operations and persons should not be allowed to operate outside these regulations

What is the Nature of the Case?



Civil **Administrative Law** Judge must determine whether the Respondent has caused harm to the environment or unintentionally violated some regulation or statute.

Criminal

Judge or Jury must determine whether the individual or company has willfully or knowingly violated a statute that prohibits some type of activity.







Punishment

Civil

Up to \$32,500 for each day of violation

the cost to the state of any response action made necessary by such violation

Criminal

FELONY

when the substance is one that endangers or that could endanger human life or health, fined \$1,000,000 or the cost of any cleanup and in addition \$100,000 per violation, and costs of prosecution, or imprisoned at hard labor for not more than ten years.

MISDEMEANOR

\$25,000 per violation, and costs of prosecution, or imprisoned for not more than one year



Criminal Investigative Process

- Inspectors, Victims & Disgruntled employee.
- Information resources on corporation.
- The processes at the facility.
- Regulatory interpretation.
- Multi-agency, multi-discipline cooperation.
- Investigative discretion.
- Working with the Prosecutor.
- HEALTH & SAFETY CONCERNS.

- Disposing of Trash Illegally
- \$200 fine

- Denials then... drums and drums and drums




















Crimes and Misdemeanors
